Points of Interest

1 Everglades

Stretching out over 734 square miles, the 'Glades are the largest subtropical wilderness in the United States and home to wet sawgrass prairies, dry tropical hardwood hammocks and pinelands, mangrove swamps and two estuaries

2 South Beach

Lovingly nicknamed SoBe, this colorful neighborhood is one of the wealthiest and most prosperous areas in Miami Beach offering fabulous shopping, world-class dining, spectacular beaches and one of the hottest club scenes in America.

3 Ocean Avenue

Located in Miami Beach, Ocean Avenue plays host to the Art Deco Historic District. With over 800 preserved structures, it's one of the largest areas in the U.S. on the National Register of Historic Places.

4 Collins Avenue

Nicknamed "Millionaire's Row," Miami Beach's trendy and upscale 13-mile-long ocean front avenue boasts chic shops and Art Deco hotels including the famous Fontainebleau Hotel.

5 Coral Gables

Developed in the 1920s as one of the country's first planned communities, its architectural treasures include National Landmarks such as the impressive Biltmore Hotel, and nine properties on the National Register of Historic Places.

6 Coconut Grove

Founded in 1873 in the heart of Miami, this laid-back, bohemian neighborhood offers an eclectic mix of attractions such as the Vizcaya Museum and Gardens, Barnacle State Historic Park, and CocoWalk, an entertainment complex.
